Tim Sloane is the Executive Director of the Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations (PCFFA), as well as its sister organization, the Institute for Fisheries Resources (IFR). He earned his law degree from Golden Gate University with specialization in Environmental Law in 2013, and is a licensed attorney in California. Tim practiced litigation, including with a San Francisco firm specializing in Clean Water Act citizen suit enforcement actions, until he recently made the transition to policy work when he joined with PCFFA and IFR. Before entering the practice of law, Tim performed metal work and carpentry at a science museum in Berkeley.

Tim is a lifelong coastal Californian, with deep ties to both southern California and the Bay Area. He is a longtime outdoorsman and spends his free moments exploring the North Coast and the Sierras.
